YOUR ULTIMATE LIST

I have a confession to make. I'm a list-maker. Each Monday begins with a list. The list contains everything that must be done before the next week, big or small. Some weeks I find that the list grows faster than I can add my coveted check marks. The goal, of course, is to see every single line marked with that perfect check. I even have a system for marking work in progress, until completed. I also keep lists of other tasks which have not yet been assigned a timeframe. Those lists feature things like drawers to clean, notes to send, gifts to purchase, as well as trips to plan, recipes to try, life goals, and endearing quotes or scripture passages. I've even been thinking of beginning a list of questions that pop into my head, which are often unusual and random. Those who know me well know of this penchant (let's not call it obsession) with lists. It's one of the things that makes me tick.

But while I love the way my lists help me remember and stay focused, I can also feel tied to the lists in ways which aren't helpful. If I think more about the checkmark than the child (or adult) who needs my attention, I'm not fulfilling my purpose. The list is supposed to be a tool, controlled by me, not the other way around.

My friends, particularly those who are parenting growing children, do you feel this way? Do you feel that your life is one long stream of incomplete lists? Honestly, your list should probably be incomplete! Parenting is unpredictable and requires the kind of loving attention which isn't directed by the lines of tasks you "need" to get done. When my first child was born,

I felt overwhelmed. I was drowning in my undone list of tasks. A former favorite teacher asked my mom how I was adjusting to motherhood, and the honest answer elicited one of the most comforting, loving pieces of advice that I clung to the whole time my children were growing. Mrs. Stephens said for me to remember that my job was to love my baby, keep him fed and clean, and nothing else. The basics were to be my priority. Love, food, and basic hygiene. That's all. If the house got cleaned or dinner got cooked, great. But my list had been shortened to what mattered most.

You are busy. I know you are. I see you. I hear you. I'm sure that sometimes you would like to have a personal assistant just to manage your days. And we're approaching the holidays. Your list grows longer. It happens to us all. I want to hug you and encourage you to remember the main things. What matters most is the love that blankets your family. This loving care is the first and most important way that you point them to Jesus. Please don't get distracted by the lists, the sports, the appointments, the laundry, the homework, and the many other "to -dos" in your life. I'm not saying to ignore all those things, just please keep your <u>ultimate</u> list short. Then the checkmarks on your lists can follow the basics-loving your children, while keeping them clean and fed. That's your priority. Remember that when you are deeply rooted in the Lord, he will sustain you and be your rest. All that you are. All that you do. All your lists are put into perspective when your eyes and heart remain on the Lord who loves. May His joy fill your heart and direct your lists!
